Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Investment Objectives and Strategies

The investment objective of TD Managed Aggressive Growth ETF Portfolio (the "Fund") is to seek to generate long-term capital growth with the added potential for earning a modest level of interest and dividend income. In seeking to achieve this objective, the Fund uses a strategic asset allocation strategy to invest primarily in units of TD Exchange-Traded Funds ("TD ETFs") that focus on investing in equities with greater potential capital growth. The asset allocation will generally be maintained within a range of 10% above or below the neutral weighting of 20% fixed income and 80% equities. The Fund may also invest directly in exchange-traded funds other than the TD ETFs, and may use derivatives for hedging purposes.

Risk

The risks of investing in the Fund remain as outlined in the simplified prospectus.

Results of Operations

The D-Series units of the Fund returned 21.7% for the year ended December 31, 2024 (the "Reporting Period"), versus 20.7% for the Fund's product benchmark and 29.4% for the Fund's general market index. The Fund's product benchmark is comprised of 32% Solactive US Large Cap CAD Index (CA NTR), 27% Solactive Canada Broad Market Index (CA NTR), 21% Solactive GBS Developed Markets ex North America Large & Mid Cap CAD Index (CA NTR) and 20% Solactive Broad Canadian Bond Universe TR Index. The Fund's general market index is the MSCI World Index (Net Dividend, C\$). Unlike the product benchmark and general market index, the Fund's return is quoted after the deduction of fees and expenses. Returns for other series of the Fund may vary, largely due to differences in fees and expenses. Refer to the Past Performance section for returns of various series of the Fund.

Market Update

Canada's economy came under pressure over the Reporting Period, largely as a result of tight financial conditions. Consumer spending, real estate activity and the labour market weakened. At the same time, inflationary pressures softened, moving closer to the Bank of Canada's ("BoC") 2% target. In response, the BoC began lowering interest rates in June 2024 and continued to lower rates over the remainder of the year. Overall, the BoC lowered its benchmark overnight interest rate by 1.75% to 3.25%. The BoC also suggested it would gradually lower interest rates further in 2025, hoping that looser financial conditions could ease the burden on Canadian households and help reignite consumer spending. There was also some expectation that rising demand could kickstart business activity, potentially resulting in improved job growth.

The Canadian equity market rose over the Reporting Period, with 10 of 11 sectors posting positive returns. The information technology, financials and materials sectors were the strongest performers, while communication services, real estate and health care were the weakest-performing sectors.

Lower interest rates, developments in artificial intelligence and positive investor sentiment helped push information technology stocks higher over the Reporting Period. Expectations that economic activity in Canada could pick up after multiple interest rate cuts from the BoC helped lift the financials sector higher. Additionally, the dividends of financials sector stocks became more attractive as interest rates declined. The materials sector benefited from higher gold prices amid economic uncertainty and ongoing geopolitical tensions. Supply concerns pushed up the prices of many commodities.

Canadian bond prices increased over the Reporting Period, with yields moving lower. The BoC's interest rate decreases helped push down Canadian bond yields, particularly those at the shorter end of the yield curve. The benchmark 10-year Government of Canada bond yield rose from 3.11% to 3.22%, with much of the gains coming early in the Reporting Period before the BoC lowered interest rates. Short-term bond prices outperformed their mid- and long-term counterparts. Corporate bond prices rose and outperformed government bonds, which also increased. Credit spreads (the difference in yields between corporate and government bonds with similar maturities) narrowed.

The U.S. economy continued to expand over the Reporting Period, demonstrating its relative strength despite tight financial conditions and softer economic activity elsewhere around the world. Consumer spending was the key driver of growth as U.S. households proved their resiliency amid high borrowing costs and elevated inflation. However, small cracks began to emerge as the Reporting Period progressed. Relatively strong manufacturing activity began to fade in response to slower demand. Real estate market activity waned with high mortgage rates weighing on demand. A slowing U.S. labour market raised concerns about the health of the overall economy. The U.S. unemployment rate rose to its highest level since 2021. In response to the slowing labour market and easing inflationary pressures, the U.S. Federal Reserve Board ("Fed") lowered the target range of its benchmark interest rate by 1.00% to 4.25%-4.50%. At its final meeting of the Reporting Period, the Fed lowered its expectations for the number of interest rate cuts in 2025 given inflation was still above its 2% target and economic conditions were relatively stable.

U.S. equities delivered a strong gain over the Reporting Period, with 10 of 11 sectors generating positive returns. Communication services, information technology and consumer discretionary were the strongest-performing sectors, while materials, health care and real estate were the weakest-performing sectors.

The communication services and information technology sectors were key drivers of U.S. equity market gains over the Reporting Period. Both benefited from the progress and expected capabilities of artificial intelligence. Investors also raised the valuations of stocks in both sectors in response to lower interest rates. U.S. consumer spending remained resilient despite tight financial conditions, which benefited the consumer discretionary sector.

International equity markets posted a small gain over the Reporting Period. Chinese equities increased, getting a boost from the government's announcement to help support China's economic activity. The financials and information technology sectors drove gains for China's equity markets. European equities posted a relatively solid gain. Financials and industrials were among the top-performing sectors in European equity markets. Among European countries, Italy, Germany and Spain were the top-performers. U.K. equities advanced, lifted by gains in the financials and industrials sectors. Japanese equities also gained, benefiting from the strong performance of the financials and energy sectors.

Key Contributors/Detractors Relative to the Product Benchmark

The Fund generated a positive return over the Reporting Period and outperformed its product benchmark.

- The Fund's underlying global equity funds were the main contributor to performance relative to equity markets, while an underweight exposure to leading U.S. equities detracted from performance.
- The Fund's exposure to TD Global Technology Leaders Index ETF contributed to performance as the information technology sector was the best-performing sector in global equity markets.
- TD Q Global Multifactor ETF also contributed to performance as equity market growth leadership continued to broaden during the Reporting Period amid improving fundamentals.
- TD Q U.S. Small-Mid-Cap Equity ETF detracted from the Fund's performance as small- and mid-capitalization stocks lagged U.S. large-caps and the broader market, despite an end-of-year rebound following the U.S. presidential election.

Key Contributors/Detractors Relative to the General Market Index

The Fund underperformed the MSCI World Index (Net Dividend, C\$) owing to the differences in geographical mix between the Fund and general market index.

Assets

The F-Series units experienced a significant increase in assets due to investor purchase activity.

Recent Developments

The Portfolio Adviser expects consumer and business activity to pick up after several central banks began to ease monetary policy and loosen financial conditions. The Portfolio Adviser also expects that performance will vary on a regional and sector basis, and that a diversified approach is warranted. That said, several risks to the outlook persist, primarily from policy risks triggered by the incoming Trump Administration, such as potential tariffs, geopolitical tensions and changes in taxation, regulation and debt spending that could lead to a rise in uncertainty. Many central banks are expected to keep lowering interest rates, which could further boost global economic activity in 2025 and help the global economy avoid a recession.

Within fixed income, the Portfolio Adviser has shifted away from government bonds as they are less attractive in an environment where growth remains strong. With much of the central bank easing already priced into the yield curve, the Portfolio Adviser has continued to reduce government fixed income holdings of longer duration (sensitivity to interest rate changes) over the course of the Reporting Period and leaned into corporate credit, which offers higher yield and return potential, provided that growth and earnings remain strong.

The Portfolio Adviser maintained the Fund's asset allocation to several quantitative, active and specialty actively managed funds that focus on growth, income and capital preservation. The Portfolio Adviser is optimistic that the Fund is well positioned relative to its product benchmark. However, the Portfolio Adviser continues to evaluate opportunities to diversify into new asset classes or underlying funds in order to enhance the Fund's potential return and/or reduce risk wherever possible.

Related Party Transactions

Affiliates of TD Asset Management Inc. ("TDAM") may earn fees and spreads in connection with various services provided to, or transactions with, the Fund, such as in connection with banking (including deposit taking), custody, securityholder account maintenance and reporting, brokerage and derivatives transactions.

Manager, Trustee and Portfolio Adviser:

TDAM, a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Toronto-Dominion Bank ("TD"), is the manager, trustee and portfolio adviser of the Fund. The Fund pays TDAM an annual management fee, which may vary for each series of the Fund. The Fund also pays an annual administration fee of 0.15%, calculated and accrued as a percentage of the net asset value, with respect to F-Series and D-Series. The Fund may hold underlying fund(s) managed by TDAM for which TDAM may be paid a fee. However, no management fees are payable by the Fund that, to a reasonable person, would duplicate a fee payable by the underlying fund(s) for the same services.

Registrar and Transfer Agent:

TD is the registrar and transfer agent of the Fund, and as such maintains all unitholder records, processes purchase, switch, conversion and redemption orders, issues investor statements and prepares annual tax reporting information on behalf of the Fund.

TD earns a foreign exchange spread when unitholders switch between units of funds denominated in different currencies. The Fund also maintains bank accounts and overdraft provisions with TD for which TD earns a fee.

Custodian:

TD is the sub-custodian of the Fund and may hold a portion of the assets (including cash and investments) of the Fund.

Buying and Selling Securities:

TDAM has established an independent review committee ("IRC") which acts as an impartial and independent committee to review and provide recommendations or, if appropriate, approvals respecting any conflict of interest matters referred to it by TDAM. The IRC prepares, at least annually, a report of its activities for securityholders of the Fund. The report is available on the TDAM website at www.td.com/ca/en/asset-management or at the securityholder's request at no cost by contacting TDAM (see front cover).

The Fund and/or underlying fund(s) in which the Fund invests relied on standing instructions from the IRC in respect of one or more of the following transactions:

- (a) trades in securities of TD or any affiliate or associate thereof;
- (b) investments in the securities of an issuer where TD Securities Inc., TDWCI, or any other affiliate of TDAM (a "Related Dealer") acted as an underwriter during the distribution of such securities and the 60-day period following the completion of the distribution of the underwritten securities;
- (c) purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund or discretionary managed account managed by TDAM; and
- (d) purchases of securities from or sales of securities to a Related Dealer, where it acted as principal.

The relevant standing instructions require that securities transactions with related parties conducted by TDAM (i) are free from any influence by an entity related to TDAM and without taking into account any consideration relevant to an entity related to TDAM; (ii) represent the business judgment of TDAM uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund and/or underlying fund(s); (iii) comply with the applicable policies and procedures of TDAM; and (iv) achieve a fair and reasonable result for the Fund and/or underlying fund(s).

Brokerage Arrangements (000s):

From time to time, the Fund may enter into portfolio securities transactions with Related Dealers who may earn commissions or spreads provided that such trades are made on terms and conditions that are comparable to non-affiliated brokerages. During the Reporting Period, the Fund paid commissions to related parties amounting to \$121 or 37.0% of total commissions paid by the Fund for portfolio transactions in total.

³ The trading expense ratio ("TER") represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average NAV during the stated period. Where a Fund invests in units of any underlying fund, the TER presented for the Fund includes the portion of TERs, if available, of the underlying fund(s) attributable to this investment.

⁴ The Fund's portfolio turnover rate ("PTR") indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio adviser manages its investments. A PTR of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the stated period. The higher a fund's PTR, the greater the trading costs payable, directly or indirectly, by the fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the fiscal year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

Management Fees

As manager and trustee of the Fund, TDAM is responsible for the overall business and affairs of the Fund, including activities related to making units of the Fund available to investors, and providing, or arranging for the provision of, investment advisory services and marketing services to the Fund. In consideration for the provision of such services, each series of the Fund pays TDAM a management fee.

Management fees are calculated and accrued as a percentage of the net asset value of each series of units of the Fund, as of the close of business on each business day for each series and are paid monthly to TDAM.

The simplified prospectus discloses a specified annual management fee rate that TDAM can charge for each series of the Fund. Where TDAM chooses to charge a management fee rate below the specified annual management fee rate, the difference represents a waiver of management fees. TDAM may waive all or a portion of the management fees being charged to the Fund, which may be discontinued at any time by TDAM at its discretion without notice to unitholders.



Past Performance



 - 21% Solactive GBS Developed Markets ex North America Large & Mid Cap CAD Index (CA NTR) – This index is comprised of large- and mid-cap companies in developed markets around the world excluding North America, net of withholding taxes; and
 - 20% Solactive Broad Canadian Bond Universe TR Index – This index is comprised of Canadian investment-grade bonds including government, quasi-government and corporate bonds.
