Q&A with Shelley Sylva

Shelley: For any business, keeping up with external changes can prove challenging. Since the beginning of the pandemic, we've seen need in our communities growing at an exponential pace. So our challenge here is to figure out how to adjust so that we can stay ahead of

these changes and continue to be effective and efficient.

But working on this challenge brings us an opportunity to dig deeper to understand the full scope of financial inclusion. For example, budgeting is important, and we all know 1+1=2, but how are we solving for those X factors that prevent people from getting to 2? Our opportunity is to get to those answers and to support those who are innovating for real solutions.

Shelley: Affordable housing, health, and community connectedness are 3 areas we are prioritizing for the rest of the year. We're fortunate to have incredible relationships with community organizations – these are the people who have boots on the ground and are working tirelessly, day in and day out, to assess and meet the needs of the community. Because of this, we can take a very hyper local approach to determine where to focus our

to be better prepared for the future through We know housing affordability is top-of-mind for people all across the country, so this is one ever-present change? of our biggest areas of focus. We are also taking action to support health and wellness organizations and programs in the communities we serve. This year, our team has done quite a bit around helping to support access to healthcare, especially when it comes to equitable access to early testing and screening. For example, in the Black community, we've focused on supporting colon cancer screening programs, as Black Americans are 20% more likely to get colon cancer and 40% more likely to die from it.1

A great example is our recent work with the International African American Museum in Charleston, South Carolina. Shelley: It's challenging to highlight just one initiative, but I am especially proud of our annual Housing for Everyone competition, because the impact is incredible and so far-reaching. Housing for Everyone is our preeminent program; through the TD Charitable Foundation, we provide grants to non-profits across the United States to support affordable housing initiatives. What is really special about this program is that each year, we focus on the most urgent, pressing housing needs in the communities we serve. For example, this year, the




