In my past roles leading businesses at TD,

I've long felt an immense pride in the TD Ready Commitment and our long history of environmental leadership. Since assuming my role as head of the Sustainability and Corporate Citizenship team in September, I've been amazed to see first-hand how our business, people and philanthropy come together every day to help create a more inclusive, equitable and sustainable future. As 2021 draws to a close, and we continue to navigate the ever-evolving pandemic, it is

encouraging to see the collective, concerted efforts across public, private and non-profit sectors to help make progress on issues of inequity and environmental health. At TD, we are committed to working alongside other stakeholders to drive change and help create the conditions where customers, communities and colleagues feel confident about the future and have an opportunity to succeed. At the United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP 26) last month, we saw increasing recognition that urgent action

is needed to address climate change - and severe weather events unfolding in real time remind us of the importance of this work. This quarter, we continued to make progress in our Environmental, Social and Governance efforts, building on our Climate Action Plan. In October, we announced that TD pledged to join the Net-Zero Banking Alliance (NZBA), along with five of Canada's other largest banks. This United Nations-convened, industry-led initiative aims to accelerate and support efforts to address climate change and TD is committed to being a central player in the work needed to enable sustainable growth. 

TD commits \$10M in the continued effort to combat anti-Black racism and systemic discrimination in Canada As part of our commitment to helping to drive progress towards a more inclusive, equitable and sustainable tomorrow, TD announced \$10 million in funding over the

next five years to the Black Opportunity Fund (BOF). Founded in 2020 and led by a team of diverse Black Canadian professionals, BOF is a self-described new partnership between businesses, philanthropists, foundations,

and the Black communities designed to help dismantle the structural barriers that for generations have prevented many

Black Canadians from achieving economic success.

The TD contribution will enable BOF to establish an annual philanthropic granting pool of \$400,000 to fund Blackserving community and non-profit organizations focused on the area of financial security, inspired by one of the four TD Ready Commitment Drivers of Change. The TD financial commitment will also help support long-term stable financing and resources for Black communities.

TD is committed to providing opportunities for colleagues to support the work that BOF is leading. Each year, two positions will be created for TD colleagues to apply to work on selected
